

STILLWELL WOODS IN DANGER

The unique habitat of Stillwell Woods in Syosset is being threatened by requests to expand the playing areas and to allow other exploitive uses of the preserve. Vocal local groups are petitioning Nassau County to destroy more of this open habitat. Unfortunately, there has been very little pressure from environmentalists to protect the area as a nature preserve. The permits issued to applicants for use of the area reflect the public's interest. So far this year, only a few permits have been requested by birdwatchers. If we hope to maintain this property as a preserve for use by nature lovers, we must show more of an interest by applying for permits. Write to:

Be sure to indicate that you wish to have this permit to go birdwatching. To get to Stillwell Woods in Syosset, take Route 25A east one traffic light past Route 106. Turn right on Split Rock Road, turn left at Friendly's Restaurant onto Cold Spring Road. Turn right on South Woods and park in Nassau Center on the left.

BLUEBIRDS

THE BLUEBIRDS ARE COMING !!!

Bluebirds are a colorful thought in the dull days of winter. The thought of our state bird returning to its northern breeding grounds may seem far off, but some bluebirds are already beginning their journey northward! While some bluebirds overwinter in New York, most migrate south for the colder months. Male bluebirds return to this area as early as late February in search of suitable nesting sites.

Bluebirds are cavity-nesting birds. Upon their arrival, males seek nest sites in dead trees and fence posts. Nest boxes are used when available and nest sites are claimed by mid-March.

Long Island's bluebird population has long suffered the effects of loss of habitat and competition with more aggressive and exotic bird species such as the House sparrow and the starling. You can help to re-establish a bluebird population on Long Island by erecting bluebird nest boxes.

The Right Habitat

Before you erect a bluebird nest box, be sure you have the right kind of habitat for bluebirds. Open areas with scattered trees are preferred. Large areas that are maintained by mowing, such as parks, golf courses, large lawns, pastures, and cemeteries are prime bluebird habitat. Bluebird nest boxes should be mounted at about eyelevel (4 - 5') on a pole or tree trunk in an area that is safe from vandalism. Boxes should be faced toward a tree or shrub so that when the young fledge, they can fly to protective cover.

Paying attention to where nest boxes are placed is critically important. Nest boxes erected in areas other than described above may attract birds, but not bluebirds.

The Bluebird Nest Box Network

Everything you ever wanted to know about bluebirds is published in the GUIDE TO BLUEBIRD CONSERVATION. This guide can be obtained by writing to the New York Bluebird Nest Box Network, P.O. Box 127, Delmar, New York 12054-0127. The guide contains information about the natural history of bluebirds and how to build or send away for bluebird nest boxes. Write now to get the information in time to put up your nest box by mid-March.


