The Senate version of the Alaska bill S 1500 has not yet reached the Senate To date it has been bottled floor. up in the Energy and Natural Resource Committee, which has altered the bill greatly from the House passed bill HR 39. 75% of the House-passed wilderness areas have been reassigned to less stringent management agencies like the Bureau of Land Management and the National Forest Service. HR39 passed overwhelmingly by the House, sought to keep entire ecosystems intact and under the control of a single management agency. So far, the Senate committee has fragmented these ecosystems, dividing certain areas into several smaller units each to be administered by different agencies.

Amendments on the Senate floor can restore the bill to its original form, but the two senators from Alaska have sworn to filibuster any bill which resembles HR 39. The two New York senators need letters urging them to help bring the bill to the Senate floor promptly, to vote for strengthening amendments and to vote for cloture should there be an attempted filibuster. It is disappointing to note that neither N.Y. senator cosponsored S 1500 although they could still do so if enough pressure was placed on them. The Nongame Fish and Wildlife Conservation Act of 1978 (HR 10255) is at present being kept off the House floor by pressure from the administration. It seems the administration has requested the Speaker of the House, Mr. Tip O'Neill, and the Chairman of the Rules Committee, Mr. James Delany, to block the bill from reaching the floor because a veto would be embarassing to the administration which had earlier given support to the bill.

The threat of a veto exists because the Office of Management and Budget is opposed to the bill on the grounds that it is not necessary and inflationary. Both of these points have been countered, the first by studies prepared by the Council on Environmental Quality and the Fish and Wildlife Service demonstrating the need for such a bill. The cost can be lowered by language changes on specific appropriations. What is needed is an outpouring of mail to the President, Speaker of the House and the Chairman of the Rules Committee. It is up to us to convince them of a need for a nongame fish and wildlife program.

The red-footed boobies make long fishing trips far out to sea; they feed to a large extent on flying fish. Since the red-foots fly so far for their food, the average egg-sitting stint is 60 hours, and the egg is often deserted and many chicks are starved, particularly in times of poor fishing. Only one egg is laid, as this is probably all the parents can take care of. As if these boobies did not have enough problems, they must also contend with the piratical frigate birds, which I will describe in my next article. Al Lemke The following is an article written by SSAS member Ruth Grossman on our very successful August boat trip.

On Sunday morning, August 20, at a little before 8:00 a.m., a group of various ages and both sexes assembled before Captain Ed Olsen's trim craft, "The Norseman II", on the Freeport waterfront. Fishermen? Absolutely not: We were 39 ardent Auduboners laden down with binoculars, cameras, a scope, a guitar and, of course, lunch kits, bags and baskets. Weather predictions had varied from beautiful to thunder showers. We had both sun and clouds but it was a lovely boat ride on Great South Bay. The birding was excellent. Everybody's spirits were high. Elliott Kutner and Paul Butkereit as usual were very helpful in identifying some of the less common birds such as willets, Louisiana herons, green herons, whimbrels and oystercatchers.

We also saw yellow legs, blackbellied plovers, sanderlings, dowitchers (long-billed and short), spotted sandpipers, ruddy turnstones, snipes, double-crested cormorants, little blue herons, a fish crow, common (Amer.) and snowy egrets, tree swallows, black backed gulls, common terns, skimmers, great blue heron, immature laughing gulls, a marsh hawk, glossy ibis, immature herring gulls, sandpipers, semi-palmated plover and least terns.

Coming home at 3:45 p.m. from our farthest point, North Line Island, the traffic was heavy - some of the mariners steered like "drunken sailors but the Bay was smooth - we all had a wonderful day and look forward to a repetition of the event next August:

Birding in Arizona 🏖



Southeastern Arizona is one of the most exciting areas for birding in the U.S. More than 300 species of birds have been recorded on a regular basis, yet this is but one facet of one's experience. The mountains, deserts, canyons and grasslands create a scenery of such grandeur and diversity that one's interest is constantly stimulated.

Lynne and I joined an eight-day tour out of Tucson led by three very delightful and expert birders of Northeast birding. There were 16 of us neophytes - all levels of ignorance and expertise - yet we were treated to as much personal instruction and attention as we desired.

We toured by van and station wagon the Sonoran and Chihuahuan deserts, the Huachuca, Chiricahua, and Patagonian mountain ranges and into the remote Guadalupe Canyon boardering Mexico. (We also never missed an aromatic sewage pond.) We were exposed to all the native birds, reptiles, amphibians, insects and flora. The entire Ecosystem was before us for sampling.

Weeks before the trip our regional expert, Rich Stallcup, scouted the area and so we were overwhelmed with bird sightings. Rare birds seen were the Elegant Trogan, Harlequin Quail, Rose-threated Becard, Plain-capped Starthroat, Ridgeway's Whip-Poor-Will, etc. For those like us, who are inspired by the obvious beauty of birds, we had sightings of such as Painted and Lazuli Buntings, Painted Redstart, Red-faced Warbler, Vermillion and Scissor-tailed Flycatchers, Calliope and Rivoli's Hummingbirds, Hepatic and Western Tanagers, and last but not least, the Black-bellied Tree Duck in all his red and pink magnificence.

Lynne and I listed more than 180 species sighted and the group claimed more than 200 birds. We also could list such delightful fauna as snakes, toads, praire dogs, kangaroo rats, turtles, tarantulas, desert foxes, deer, armadillo, and peccarys. Also noted were the regional insects and flora.

We birded from about 5:00 a.m. until supper. We stood in the desert surrounded by silence suddenly broken by a cacophony of sounds as the sun rose over the surrounding mountains. With the help of our leaders we could sort out the call of the Cactus Wren, Desert Sparrow, Kangaroo Rat and Gambel's Quail. New York was never like this.

During the day, while driving, a sudden stop meant - fresh kill. We gathered from the road a dead Yellowbilled Cuckoo, Road Runner, Montezuma Quail, Shrike and Lesser Nighthawk. These were dissected, by one of our leaders, for study specimens and, believe it or not, for a tasty broiled morsel.

At night after supper, we all sprawled ed exhausted and numb...but we moved out again to go owling in the dark, armed with flashlights and binoculars. It is benign madness to stand calling owls by voice or tape recorder in the depths of a mountain canyon beneath the stars but who can describe the exhiliration of hearing and then seeing the answering Whiskered Owl.

The trip is an experience almost beyond description. The timing is perfect during the summer months. The leaders are inspirational, delightful companions. Anyone who would like to expand his or her birding horizon must consider birding in Arizona.

Las Islas Encanta**d**as The Galapagos Islands Part II - Tower - Red-Foot District

For three years, our friend and travel agent, SSAS member Horty Block, had worked to arrange this trip for usat least a week in the Galapagos, with flights from and back to the mainland. Horty had to content herself with the satisfaction of a job well done, but Tower made the long wait well worth while for us.

We arrived off Tower early in the morning, and shortly after breakfast our launch took us to the beach where we waded ashore. We landed at Darwin Bay, where in 1964 Bryan Nelson spent several months studying the birdlife on this otherwise uninhabited island. Nelson's excellent book "Galapagos-Islands of Birds", together with Ian Thornton's equally readable "Darwin's Islands-A Natural History of the Galapagos," are the source of most of the factual material in this series.

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Tower is mainly noted for its nesting colonies of red-footed boobies and their piratical persecutors, the frigate birds. Boobies, which are members of the order Pelecaniformes, have feet webbed between all four toes, whereas most seabirds are webbed only between three toes. Lacking a brood pouch, boobies incubate their eggs under their feet, which are well lined with blood vessels which emanate heat. Like the pelicans, they are plunge divers, and to a variable degree nest in colonies.

Of the six species of boobies, three the red-foot, blue-foot, and masked (or white) - breed in the Galapagos. Except for the rare Abbott's booby, which breeds only on Christmas Island, the red-foot is the only arboreal nesting booby, which ac counts for their preference for Tower, which is, at least in comparison with most of the other islands, rather densely cover ed with dried scrub. Nelson estimated about 140,000 pairs nest on this island. Red-foots are small as boobies go; the mal is the smallest booby of all, about 28" long and a wing span of almost 5 feet. The female (as in all boobies) is larger than the male, weighing an average 1,050 grams to the male's 950 (454 grams equal 1 lb.).

Unlike the other boobies, the red-foot actually constructs a nest, consisting of a platform of twigs a few feet above the ground or occasionally on branches on the The nest is built by the female ground. from material brought by her mate. Their feet are extremely flexible and prehensile, ideal for clasping the twigs among which the booby is surprisingly agile and dexter-They do not need to walk on the ous. ground, and they cannot do so with any facility. Their legs are proportionately much shorter than in other boobies, and they shuffle along awkwardly on the ground

Red-footed boobies are dimorphic, occur ing in two distinct color forms-brown and white. On Tower the brown form outnumbers the white by about twenty to one, although we were fortunate enough to see both. The brown race on Tower are more or less entirely brown, while in the red-foot's range as a whole most have at least some white on the belly and tail. The white forms often have a variable yellowish tinge on the head and neck and are never as dazzling white as the masked booby. All the juveniles are brown, and the whites take two or three years to gain full adult plumage. (Continued on Page 3)
