


Subject: Endangered Species Speaker: Mr. Mark Phillips

"BRING IN A FRIEND"

South Shore Audubon is unique in many ways, but there is one area in which we are not unique and that is the ever pressing need for new members to help support the organization. For this purpose, we are embarking upon a program entitled "Bring in a Friend" to try to increase membership. Simply put we are asking you, the present membership, to recruit one or more friends to become a member of the National Audubon Society which automatically makes them members of the SSA. Theoretically, if each of you were to bring in one new member we could double our membership in a short period of time.

Many of you have complained, and rightfully so, that you have not received the Skimmer on time. This is due to the astronomical printing and mailing costs incurred each time the Skimmer is mailed. Each issue costs approximately \$600.00. This is a large portion of our budget. We would like to mail the Skimmer using First Class Mail but we can not afford such luxuries. As you know, we also require funds for programs, scholarships, donations to environmental organizations, aid to Theodore Roosevelt Sanctuary, stationary, correspondence, and other functions mandated by the National

Audubon Society.

The monies to do all of the above come, for the most part, from a small percentage of the membership dues paid to the National Audubon upon renewal of the membership. We do, however, receive our share of new membership dues if the membership is through Chapter recruitment.

South Shore Audubon is on the threshold of really expanding its sphere of influence and recognition in the community through its awareness of the interconnectedness of all life and the cumulative impact on humankind's activities on the health of life support systems — the air, water, and land.

So I appeal to you to help in this campaign to increase our membership so that we may continue to operate in the manner that we have been able to do these many years.

ACID RAIN

My file of news clippings and magazine articles on acid rain was started during 1983. Since then the file has grown by 39 articles taken from the New York Times, Sierra Club and News magazines. Many more people have been made aware and they are demanding a solution.

The Senate Environmental and Public Works Committee (Federal) will introduce a bill on March 25, 1986 which proposes to:

- (1) regulate electric power plants, cars, trucks and a variety of air pollutants in the entire United States.
- (2) require the President to engage in treaty negotiations with Canada and Mexico on acid rain.
- (3) impose an environmental tariff on goods imported from countries whose pollution controls are less stringent than those of the United States.

President Reagan has not been persuaded to accept the solutions. We cannot delay! Drew Lewis, President Reagan's special representative on acid rain, would postpone any effective action to the indefinite future.

We have the technology. Those who cause pollution should eliminate poison emissions.

No more delays -- No more procrastination -- No more shielding the producers of nitrogen dioxide and carbon dioxide from the expense of protecting us. DEMAND ACTION.

The time to act is NOW. Your elected officials should be kept informed of your opinions on this subject.


