CONSERVATION

JOAN BUTKEREIT

We have, in New York State, a chance to further protect endangered and threatened species. This protection would take the form of a law called the Essential Habitat Bill. The legislation would offer protection to lands and waters that form the habitat that is essential for the survival of endangered and threatened species.

The groundwork for this legislation has begun through the inventorying of habitats on file in the Endangered Species Unit of the DEC, through the Breeding Bird Atlas and through the Nature Conservancy's Natural Heritage Program. This bill is so important because the major cause of wildlife extinction is the destruction and loss of natural habitat. The DEC estimates that 2/10 of 1%, or 76,000 acres, will be regulated by this law.

If you have an interest in helping to safeguard critical habitat for the survival of endangered and threatened species in New York State, I urge you to write to your State Senator, State Assembly member, Senator Hugh Farley, who is the chairperson of the Environmental Conservation Committee, and Governor Mario Cuomo.



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N.A.S. CONVENTION

Beautiful Bellingham, Washington, on Puget Sound, 90 miles north of Seattle and 55 miles south of Vancouver, will be the site of the 1987 National Audubon Society Convention, August 24-29.

The Washington Audubon chapters, hosts for the convention, are planning many diverse and exciting activities, including pelagic trips, birding and wildflower outings to Mt. Rainier, Mt. Baker and Mt. POISONS

As wildlife rehabilitators, we received a letter from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation asking that we report all suspected cases of wild bird poisonings. DEC is particularly interested in poisonings resulting from the application of pesticides to lawns, golf courses and the grassy areas of parks.

If you find a dead bird, please immediately package it in a plastic bag and attach to the bag the date and the exact location where found. Freeze the bird immediately and call (518) 439-8017 - Mr. Ward B. Stone, Associate Wildlife Pathologist, NYSDEC Wildlife Resources Center, Delmar, N.Y. 12054-9767. He may send someone to pick up the bird for testing.

Remember that if you or a lawn company spray your property with chemicals such as diazinon, cholinesterase inhibiting pesticides, isofenphor or others, birds are in certain danger. Golf courses occasionally use insecticides also (sometimes on purpose to get rid of geese) Some waterfowl eat grass and garden and song birds eat earthworms and other insects which have absorbed or ingested these poisons. Birds will die from ingesting these "foods" and waterfowl may drown as a result of becoming uncoordinated and unable to hold up their heads while swimming.

For your own protection, if you enter an area that has been sprayed, remember that pesticides can be inhaled or absorbed directly through the skin and some, such as parathion, are highly toxic to humans as well as to wildlife. Your dog or cat may also be in danger.




Purple Martin Colony Registry

The Purple Martin is a bird which has been managed by man longer than any other North American bird species, Even before European man colonized the New World, native American indians were enticing these companionable birds to nest in their villages by attaching hollowed-out gourd "nest boxes" to the support poles of their wigwams. Modern man has continued this gourd-using tradition to attract martins, but he also has taken to using elaborate wooden, plastic, or aluminum multi-compartmented bird condos (i.e. "martin houses") which he mounts on poles and proudly displays on

Today however, this man-dependant species is declining within parts of its breeding range. In an attempt to remedy the situation, the Purple Martin Conservation Association has been formed to help coordinate the management efforts of North America's martin landlords. Through its Colony Registry Program it is attempting to locate and register most of the martin colonies in North America in preparation for several worthwhile projects, including a continent-wide nest-record card scheme.



If you know of someone who has a martin colony or is trying to attract one, or if you are interested in starting a colony yourself, please write to the P.M.C.A. You can further assist by looking for martin houses or gourds in peoples' yards during your travels. If you locate some, please try to obtain the mailing addresses from either the street & house numbers, rural mailboxes, phone books, or by stopping to inquire. 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

FIX FAUCET LEAKS:

- 1. Replace old washers in faucets.
- 2. Turn off faucets tightly so they don't drip.
- 3. Don't leave water running while you do something else.

4. Equip kitchen faucets with aerators to reduce volume and increase pressure.








Use low setting in clothes washer for small loads. Remember Permanent Press Cycle uses more water than the Regular Cycle.
