"OLD PLAINVIEW" HEARING RESCHEDULED

Shortly after last month's *Skimmer* went to press, the primary applicant seeking zoning changes and waivers of covenants and restrictions for 165 acres along Old Country Road in the Plainview—Old Bethpage area requested a postponement of the hearing, which has been rescheduled by the Town of Oyster Bay for **Tuesday, March 6**. The daytime meeting will be at Town Hall, 54 Audrey Ave., Oyster Bay, starting at 10 a.m. The nighttime meeting will be at the Plainview—Old Bethpage Middle School on Central Park Road in Plainview, starting at 7 p.m.

According to the Executive Summary of the recently released Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS), the proposed development of the land, which is owned by Charles Wang, would result in the changes mentioned in the next two paragraphs.

The 143.2-acre southern parcel, which would have an entrance from Round Swamp Road opposite the one for Old Bethpage Village Restoration, would have meadow/

brushland increased from 17.38 acres (12.14%) to 32.75 acres (22.96%); forest/woodland decreased from 94.84 acres (66.21%) to 6.09 acres (4.25%); a pond and waterfall added to 0.88 acres (0.61%); roads, buildings, and other paved surfaces in-

creased from 11.37 acres (7.93%) to 51.47 acres (35.93%); turf grasses and landscape area increased from 17.65 acres (12.32%) to 46.44 acres (32.42%); 2.01 acres (1.40%) of low-maintenance vegetation removed; native plant species added to 3.09 acres (2.16%); and a recharge basin added to 2.53 acres (1.77%).

The 21.73-acre northern parcel (540 feet east of Newtown Road) currently contains 1.41 acres (6.49%) of forest/woodland, with the rest being roads, buildings, and other paved surfaces. The proposal would eliminate the forest/woodland while adding meadow or brushland (1.04 acres), turf grasses and landscaping (5.02 acres), and native plant species (0.26 acres).

South Shore Audubon's Board of Directors is opposed to the zoning changes and waivers sought by the developer, whose "smart-growth" plan would, according to the DEIS, leave only 27.11% of the site in its "natural and undisturbed condition" and virtually obliterate its forest.

The southern parcel is adjacent to the very narrow Trailside State Park, which is one of our Research Committee's bird data-collection sites.

When Nassau County sold the southern parcel in the late 1990s with the intent that it be developed, the Town of Oyster Bay approved using 45.92 acres for office space, 40.11 acres for parkland and recreation, and 61.16 acres for government purposes. The current proposal would erect 133 townhouses, 318 condominiums, 48 units of Next Generation and Senior housing, 160 luxury rentals (on the northern parcel), 8 office buildings, a restaurant, shops (both parcels), a 300-room luxury hotel, and a 30-room lodge.

HAND-FEED MORTON'S SONGBIRDS WITH SSAS!

On Saturday, March 31, we will meet at 10 A.M. at Morton National Wildlife Refuge, located on the peninsula of Jessups Neck in Noyack, which is just west of Sag Harbor. Bring or share sunflower seeds or shelled peanuts if you want to experience having Black-capped Chickadees, White-breasted Nuthatches, Tufted Titmice, and maybe Northern Cardinals land on your outstretched hand a few minutes after you get out of your car and enter the main trail. We should see many other bird species too.

Established in 1954 through a donation by the Morton family, the 187-acre Elizabeth A. Morton National Wildlife Refuge (according to its website) "boasts exceptionally diverse habitats, including bay beach, a brackish pond, a freshwater pond, kettle holes, tidal flats, salt marsh, freshwater marsh, shrub, grasslands, maritime oak forest, and red cedar."

Directions to Morton: Sunrise Highway (Route 27) eastbound (from LI Expressway take exit 70, County Road 111 and follow signs to Rt. 27 east; from Southern State Parkway, take exit 44 for Sunrise Highway). Route 27 will change from a highway to a local roadway. A few miles past the Stony Brook Southampton campus (and 17.1 miles from County Road 111), make a left at the County Road 52 intersection (the sign points left for North Sea and Noyack). Proceed 0.9 miles and turn left at a traffic light onto County Road 38. Go 1.4 miles and turn right onto Noyack Road (look for a sign on the right side of the road, "Morton Refuge 5 Miles"). The refuge entrance is on the left.

The parking fee is \$4 per vehicle, payable by inserting a check or cash in an envelope. Any questions? Call Wendy Murbach at 546-6303. Heavy rain cancels.
